LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Parents and Community Members:

This is the month that the difficult decision-making begins on the school district's budget before it is finalized and adopted by the Board of Education. With these tough economic times, your input is even more valuable than ever. If you can't get to a Board meeting on Thursday evenings, please feel free to email or call us with your comments or concerns. I am also willing to add a different location and/or time to meet with groups of people who would like to discuss the budget and/or the budget process and would be open to your suggestions in that area as well. Our goal is to put together a budget that meets the needs of the students, maintains an excellent program, and doesn't put a strain on family resources. To do that, we are trying to create more efficient ways of running the district and eliminating waste wherever we find it. Sharing your observations with us can help us achieve those goals.

The Health & Wellness Committee just finished a "pyramid" of interventions designed to prevent bullying in the district. This will be published in student handbooks. It was a valuable experience to talk about what has been done, what is being done, and how much more we could do in this area. When students hear the same message in school and at home about "treating others as you would like to be treated," it reinforces the polite, respectful behavior that makes us so proud of our students!

The Board of Regents approved the New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards for English Language Arts (ELA) and Literacy; the New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards for Mathematics; and the New York State Prekindergarten Learning Standards. The Board had previously adopted the national Common Core Standards in July 2010 with the understanding that additional New York State specific K-12 expectations and prekindergarten standards would be added later. As of early July 2010, twenty states had formally adopted these Common Core Standards. By 2012-13, all classroom instruction is expected to be fully aligned to the new standards. For us, this means reworking the curriculum and potentially shifting topics from one grade level to another.

The RUMOR Mill/Q & A Forum

Do you have a question that would be of interest to others and don't know who to ask? Or have you gotten a variety of answers to the same question, depending on who was asked? The purpose of this column is to inform the public and "set the record straight" on topics that are of interest to students, staff, parents, and community members. Question #1: Do you have any update on whether schools will be allowed to sell chocolate milk?

Answer: The most current information we have is that schools will only be allowed to sell 1% or skim milk and that all flavored milk (like chocolate milk) will need to be skim (fat free). Mrs. Wood, Newfield's Food Service Director, is surveying school milk suppliers to find out if fat-free chocolate milk is available.

Question #2: Has there been a change in the date for the next early release day?

Answer: Yes. The May early release day will be on May 13th, not May 6th. This will enable our district to host the New York State School Music Association's Solo Festival that weekend. Details about time of dismissal will be forthcoming.

Question #3: When will next year's calendar be available?

Answer: The proposed 2011-2012 school calendar will be on a Board of Education agenda in March. Once it is adopted by the Board of Education, it can be published and made available to parents, staff and community.

MUSIC IN OUR SCHOOLS MONTH

March has been officially designated by The National Association for Music Education for the observance of Music In Our Schools Month (MIOSM®). This is the time of year when music education becomes the focus of schools across the nation.

MIOSM began as a single statewide celebration in 1973, and has grown over the decades to encompass a day, then a week, and then in 1985 to become a month long celebration of school music. The purpose of MIOSM is to raise awareness of the importance of music education for all children, and to remind citizens that school is where all children should have access to music. MIOSM is an opportunity for music teachers to bring their music programs to the attention of the school and the community and to display the benefits school music brings to students of all ages.

Newfield's music department is nationally ranked as one of the Best Communities for Music Education in the United States. One of just 174 other schools, the elementary school was named to this list in 2010, the only elementary program in New York State and one of only five elementary programs in the nation to be recognized with this honor. Newfield offers a wide variety of programs for our students including string lessons, band, chorus, general music, and other specialized classes, courses, and performing ensembles.

This month the music department will be celebrating Music in our Schools Month in a number of ways including concerts, field trips, and the high school musical. Thank you to the Newfield community for its continued support for music in our schools. Music is a gift that lasts a lifetime!

March Blast from the Past

Hal Smith graduated from Newfield in 1987 and later attended University at Albany as both an undergraduate and graduate student. Hal enjoyed the academic opportunities of the large college because it “enabled me to take a wide variety of classes from some of the leading experts in their fields.”

Hal is currently employed as an Associate Professor of Information Sciences and Technology at Penn State. His primary responsibilities are teaching and research but he comments that an “amazing aspect of my job is having the freedom to learn and think about anything I want. I have a wide variety of research interests which include software architecture, network science, and data mining as well as pure mathematics. While my time in traditional classes is great, mentoring students as they work with me on my research projects and begin to pursue their own research questions is what really makes me look forward to going to work.”

Hal offers the following advice to students of Newfield: “Obviously, doing well academically is important if you want to have the options you hope for. Pursue opportunities that excite and interest you, not just ones that lead to an outcome you think you should obtain. Move away for a while...far away. You can always move back. You will learn more about yourself and the world if you remove yourself from the familiar. Pay attention to the other aspects of life. Academics are important but you also need to develop a good work/life balance. Time is a finite, non-renewable, continuously consumed resource with no alternatives – use it wisely.”

Excellence – What does it really look like?

Shortly after becoming principal, I began sharing with students, staff, and families my observation that Newfield High School is a great place to be. It's small, it's friendly, people know each other, and everyone looks out for each other. Now that the first semester has ended and we are moving slowly towards spring, I can confirm that this early observation was accurate. Newfield High School is, indeed, a great place to be.

At the same time, Newfield High School is dynamic – a living breathing community that we recreate on a daily basis. For this reason, it is essential that we frequently reflect on how things are going so that we can monitor our direction and make adjustments if we begin drifting off course. I would like to take this opportunity to suggest that a minor adjustment needs to be made so that we can continue moving towards the goal of all students achieving excellence.

It is my firm belief that our educators are doing great work, that our students are highly capable, and that our families care deeply about the success of their children. However, I want to take a risk and state that a culture of excuse-making is slowly creeping its way into the fabric of our school community – a culture that threatens the very excellence that we all want to see our young people achieve.

Speaking for myself, there have been a few times during the last month or so that I have erred on the side of being too nice, when what I really needed to do was to hold firm. I have given in when what I really should have done was communicated my absolute belief in the student's ability to meet the high expectations we have set. I have come to realize that excellence looks like all of us communicating our highest expectations to our students and our children, and all of us consistently maintaining these high expectations no matter how much our students or children resist taking responsibility for meeting them.

As we move into spring, you have my word that I will make decisions that reinforce my belief that **all of our students can achieve excellence**. I challenge you to do the same. Together, let's agree that if the PE final is supposed to be 1,000 words, then 850 words just won't do. If the eligibility form is due on Monday morning at 8:05, then Monday morning at 10:15 is absolutely too late. If the teacher says that a student's behavior is disrupting class, then this behavior needs to change. Together, let's agree to communicate to our young people in Newfield High School that we don't need to make excuses for them. They CAN rise to the level of excellence that we have set. They are able to do this, they are expected to do this, and they will become better people for having done so.

School grounds are closed at dusk. Students and others not attending a specific event will need to leave the campus at dusk each evening.
